Procedure for obtaining tickets is as follows:

Tickets will be sent to you by email in which you will transfer to your phone to show when you go to the game for entrance into the building

6. CN RETIREE OBTAINS THIRD UNIVERSITY DEGREE AT AGE 76

John Bond, 76, a CN retiree who spent 36 years in CN's Bridges & Structures (B&S) group in the Great Lakes Region, recently bagged a degree from the University of Toronto, Mississauga, (UTM) campus.

But it took a while for John to finish his latest educational milestone; in fact, it took him 12 years to graduate with a double major in history and classical civilization from UTM amidst his engineering work and world travels. He was the oldest


John first obtained a degree in engineering from the University of Toronto's St. George in 1968, followed by a

master's degree in applied engineering.

graduate at UTM's June 7, 2023, convocation.

John started at CN in 1969 as an inspection and planning engineer in the B&S group and retired in 2005 as a structural engineer. He was one of the few CN engineering employees who spent their entire career in the Great Lakes Region.

After CN, he worked for AECOM on rail engineering assignments for 12 years, mostly on VIA Rail Canada Inc. bridge work programs in southern Ontario, including the carrier's Chatham Subdivision and lines in the Ottawa area.

John said: "My best sense of accomplishment at CN was working on bridges, transforming some dicey structures into first-class bridges."

One particularly challenging job was upgrading a CN bridge over the French River in Northern Ontario, with only a small group of men working in an area with no road access and dealing with the challenge of getting materials to the site solely by rail.

His least favourite work was wreck or washout response, with the unrelenting pressure from Operations to get the mainline open again for traffic.

John has mixed his love of history with a passion for travel, having visited London, Dublin, Paris, Lisbon, Rome, and Amsterdam. He plans to visit London again with his son, who has never been there.

As for his studies, John says he has benefited from his wife Lynda's admonition to always "'Read with a purpose.'

"That means that I've picked out areas of history that stand out, that teach us about the world and how we got here."

John is not finished with school yet-- he intends to continue university studies as a non-degree student at UTM. His next course is entitled, *Worlds Colliding: The History and Ecology of Exploration, Contact, and Exchange.* The course is described as follows: "Before 1492, no one in Europe ate tomatoes, no one in South America herded cattle, no one in Asia cooked with chili peppers, and no one in North America fell sick with influenza. The exchange of plants, animals, and microbes between the Americas and Afro-Eurasia in the wake of Christopher Columbus' first voyage across the Atlantic

forever changed the world's histories and ecologies. In this course we will examine these changes, which created global systems and ecological challenges that continue to shape our world today."
