### PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

In this message, I would like to briefly explain how the Pension Committee (PC) works and our role as the Pensioners' Association representatives within that committee. In my opinion, our participation in the PC is the most important thing we can do for our pensioners.

The PC meets four times per year. The company prepares an annual report, The Pension Committee Annual Report (PCAR), which is reviewed by the PC and then sent out to all Pension Plan members, including active members and retirees/ surviving spouses. This report details the financial and membership status of the plan. It also gives an overview of the investment strategies and returns on investment of the CN Investment Division (CNID), which manages the money in our plan trusts.

The PC consists of three main groups, each of which have six regular members and six alternates. The groups are the company (CN), the unions and the pensioners. Each group now has a named co-chair. As President of the Pensioners' Association, I am Co-Chair for the pensioners. Each member of the PC must sign an Oath of Confidentiality and a Code of Conduct form as some items discussed are confidential.

Prior to each quarterly meeting, the co-chairs get together with the plan administrators and set the agenda for the upcoming meeting. All PC members receive reports for the upcoming meeting. This includes the list by month of pension applicants submitted over the past months since the last meeting. These reports are prepared by LifeWorks (formerly known as Morneau Shepell). Each PC member reviews these documents prior to the meeting and there is a representative from LifeWorks at the meeting to answer any questions we may have regarding a specific individual case. If all is in order, the submissions are approved as per the stipulations within the Pension Plan. The president of CN Investment Division makes presentations on the status of the portfolio and the impact of various global developments. During 2020 at the height of the Covid turmoil in the global markets, CNID made plan status presentations at each Pension Committee meeting. These are formal presentations in an informal setting where we can question and discuss in order to better understand what is happening with the Pension Plan fund (presently at about \$18 billion). This sounds like a huge sum, but we have to recognize there is approximately \$940 million paid out each year to retirees/survivors.

Mercer Inc. is the plan actuary. They also make presentations to the PC and report on issues critical to the status of the Plan, which can impact future contributions by CN to the plan. Those variables include interest rates, bond market futures, federal government regulation changes affecting pension plans if any, as well as longevity rate tables. They also report on the financial position of the Escalation Account. The balance in that account determines if we will get an indexation increase or not, and the amount of money in the Escalation Account depends on how well the Investment Division is doing with the investment of our pension funds. Again, we (CNPA) are there for the presentations and question periods/ discussions.

So, how important is it for us pensioners to be represented on the Pension Committee? We think it is very important to the continued health and proper functioning of our Pension Plan, but as importantly, keeping members abreast of the status of the plan and improvements when certain financial conditions permit.

Think about it.

Your participation would be a benefit to the PC, Pension Plan participants and perhaps more importantly, to yourself.

### **Railroaders in the Community**

The Railroaders in the Community program is built on a foundation of CN employees/retirees providing volunteer services for charitable organizations of their choice. They then register those volunteer hours on the Benevity website and for that, CN provides additional financial contributions to those same charities. The result is the charities receive the double benefit of your service hours as well as the additional financial support, and the volunteers know they are generating that extra benefit as well.

To say the least, over the past two years, there have been Covidrelated restrictions and precautions that have provided challenges in finding some of the more traditional volunteer opportunities. But just to prove what a determined lot you are, it didn't bring the program to a complete halt.

In 2020, there were 266 registered CN retiree volunteers within the program, and collectively they generated over \$390,000 in cash contributions from CN to their selected charities. We don't have the 2021 numbers yet, but those same challenges existed, and in the next edition we will let you know how successful the 2021 program was. Hopefully, as you read this in December, we are continuing to see a little more light at the end of the proverbial tunnel, and some of those volunteer opportunities that have been challenging for the past two years start to present themselves again. Let's hope that we can make 2022 a banner year for the Railroaders in the Community program and set a high bar for volunteer hours and cash contributions to our charities.

# Kevin Smith scores for special needs kids in his community

CN retiree **Kevin Smith** has been volunteering with the Kawartha Komets Special Needs Hockey Program in Peterborough, ON, for four years but feels like he's always been there. "I sort of stumbled into it. They needed the help and I had the time. I used to play ice hockey when I was younger so it's a familiar team environment in which you continually support and encourage the players."

Players with physical, emotional and neurodevelopmental challenges of all ages play in an environment adapted to the level of their ability. Kevin's support to the organization extends in many directions, from being on the Board of Directors to coaching, scheduling practices and games for the 64 players on junior, intermediate and senior teams, and serving as Coordinator of Volunteers.

"It's really rewarding to see these players progress in the game," says Kevin, who dedicated 117 hours of volunteer time to the organization in 2020. "We have a goalie on the junior team who is blind and is supported by an on-ice helper who stands behind the net and acts as his 'eyes,' directing his moves," explains Kevin, who retired with 38 years of service with CN. "Seeing the joy on his face and on so many others like him is the reason I'm here." Carol Fisher, Executive Director of the Kawartha Komets, is grateful for Kevin's contributions. "He is a great volunteer in every capacity, flexible and eager to help out – and he enjoys every minute of it! ### Human connection, love and caring: Supporting hospice care in their community

Retiree **Tony Greig** experienced a poignant moment while visiting his dying father in palliative care in Montreal years ago. "I noticed my father had headphones on, which had been placed on him by a volunteer or staff member. When I lifted the headphones, I heard the sound of bagpipes, which were a joy to my dad who was born in Scotland. It was at this moment I knew if ever given an opportunity, I would repay this act of kindness," says Tony, who was a Systems Manager in I&T before retiring in 1995.

Tony began volunteering with Hospice Care Ottawa in 2009, a community-based non-profit organization offering palliative and end-of-life care to individuals and their loved ones. Last year, Tony generously gave 500 hours of his time to the May Court Hospice in Ottawa South. "A decade of volunteering has brought to light the importance of human connection, love, caring and dignity," says Tony. Beth Patterson, partner of railroader Tom Patterson, formerly a Project Manager in I&T and Transportation, heard from friends about the wonderful care their family members received at the Ruddy-Shenkman Hospice in her Ottawa West community. Since 2019, Beth has been greeting visitors at the reception desk. "I have learned a lot about resilience and grace," says Beth. "COVID-19 has curtailed so much of daily life and yet everyone has remained positive and helpful. I also think the CN Railroaders in the Community Program is great for recognizing the volunteer efforts of the spouses of railroaders for what we do." Since 2013, Hospice Care Ottawa has received grants from CN

totalling \$5,800 for Tony and Beth's volunteer efforts. Tom has also received CN grants for 14 years of charitable work with other organizations. In June 2021, Hospice Care Ottawa was the recipient of an additional \$5,000 grant from CN as part of a special "CN In Your Community Day" raffle celebrating the charitable work of employees and retirees.

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

The net proceeds of funds received during Frank's walk was shared equally between Jim Pattison Children's Hospital Foundation and the Shriners Hospital in Montreal. Frank's walk was also a celebration of his upcoming 95th birthday on June 15th, 2021.

The event concluded at the steps of the Saskatchewan Legislature on June 15, 2021 where Frank received his 50-year Shriners Service Pin. Frank wants all children to have hope and opportunity in life so they can succeed in whatever they wish to do. This journey took Frank from Saskatoon over 61 days of walking, stopping at towns along Highway 11 to make them aware of what the hospitals do for the children as well as raise the critical funds that are required to make the hospitals as successful as possible.

Further to the above information that was taken off the Jim Pattison Children's hospital web site, for those that know Frank, he is a retired Railroader and consequently one of our Pensioners and also a member of our Council. Frank was a Locomotive Engineer for CN, operating out of Saskatoon and originally from Regina. His intention was to walk his 5km a day, return to Saskatoon for the night, then go back and start all over again where he left off, the previous day. He arrived in Regina on the day that was scheduled amongst much fanfare and was greeted by the Saskatchewan Premier Mr. Scott Moe. Mission was accomplished.



# **The Last Spike**

On November 17, 2013, at 11 a.m., 100 years to the day since the last spike was driven near Press in 1913, a group of people from Senneterre stood in the same place to commemorate this event.

The idea had germinated in the minds of a few people, a few months earlier, to organize a small trip to Press to mark this event, but without much enthusiasm.

On November 7, 2013, 10 days before the date of the commemoration, the Société d'Histoire de Senneterre meeting of its board of directors and a member had concluded that even if nothing was done for that day, he would be on site with his wife and would watch the passenger convoy pass through Press, the approximate location where the railway was connected in 1913, connecting east to west.

As in any good organization there are people who are more organizers, one of them began to enquire about the possibility of having passenger train tickets for 45 people to get to Press (Sunday, November 17 coincided with the departure of the VIA train from Senneterre station), the rental of a school bus for the return, the possibility of having a dinner served at the Auberge du Lac Faillon and the invitations for people interested in making the trip.

At 8:45 a.m. on Sunday, November 17, 2013, the passenger convoy left the Senneterre station with 45 more passengers on board than

usual, including the mayor of Senneterre, the mayor of the parish of Senneterre, the mayor of Belcourt and several other dignitaries. Thanks to the complicity of the employees of the passenger train, our coach had been decorated to our great surprise with banners and balloons of 100 years. Moreover, we were able to stop the convoy on the two bridges of the Mégiscane River, what a spectacle!

When we went to the scene under the surveillance of a track foreman, where we made the simulation of planting the last gold spike, while giving the historical information of the event. Several photos were taken. One could notice the good mood of all the participants.

After a short trip of eight kilometres by bus, we were welcomed at the Auberge du Lac Faillon for a very good dinner. Several people took the floor telling different anecdotes and historical facts.

The return to Senneterre by bus was done with songs and several stories.

The Société d'Histoire de Senneterre had invited all participants to come and visit its exhibition on the railway, an event especially for the occasion.

Following the success of this trip, the Corporation de développement économique de Senneterre made it an annual tourist event by organizing several trips to Press each summer.

Congratulations to the winners

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Of a gentleman who spent almost 40 years of his life with CN. My dad was born in Hearst, northern Ontario, in 1925. He is Franco-Ontarian. His family (his maternal grandfather, Joseph Lambert from Charny, QC), travelled north to "save" his sons from tuberculosis. The fresh air was highly recommended for the healing of this sickness. The region was also attracting many Quebecers. At the age of 16, my dad, the eldest of a large family, had to do his duty to provide financial assistance to the family. In his hometown, he was hired as a telegram messenger for CN, delivering messages by bicycle in good and bad weather. He quickly became interested in telegraphy. A young girl of his age, from a nearby village, wrote to him on occasion and dad quickly learned the communication codes. His long agile pianist fingers must have facilitated his dexterity on the telegraph. His boss quickly noticed his talent and soon dad earned his stripes by working elsewhere than in his hometown. He was sent to remote places where he was often the only one to tend to the station for passenger and freight trains. He told me a story about one winter storm, where he had installed a red flag on the support/hook on the wall of the station meant to alert the train to stop so that it would give priority to the train coming in the opposite direction. Dad realized that the train was travelling at full speed without stopping. He went out in horror and realizes that the wind had blown the red flag to the ground. He then picked up the red flag and waved it to indicate to the tail end trainman that the train MUST ABSOLUTELY stop. Luckily, the train stopped and the story ended without any misfortune. His talent as a telegraph operator no doubt permitted dad to avoid the war. His talent as a pianist was greatly appreciated when he went to the village hotel to liven up the place with sometimes other musicians who were there. I have long heard those hours of lively jazz-flavoured music...

Dad continued to rise through his career. I remember seeing him read documents on weekends, to complete his training. He was at the origin of a policy of returning freight cars to their point of departure in order to avoid having to assume demurrage costs until their use. His long work experience from the start to his management job with CN gave him an understanding of each stage of his career. He ended his career as a Trainmaster for the Champlain region, which included Quebec, northeast USA and as far to the east as Ontario.

He even had a parking space in the basement of Place Ville-Marie, downtown Montreal. His mother had such a surge of pride when he brought her there.

My father, Yves Séguin, lived to 92 years of age. He talked with honour of his past working life at CN. And now, after his death, mom can afford to end her life in a suitable residence where mom's needs are met, thanks to dad's pension.

Thank you, dad! Thank you, Canadian National. Sylvie Séguin

They have three daughters, four grandsons and seven great-grandchildren. Sadly, they lost their youngest grandson in 2016. Bud and Iris lived in Kamloops until his retirement in December 1981. They moved to a retirement community, "Sorrento Place" on Shuswap Lake. They spent many years hosting family and friends. Bud teaching many young people how to water-ski. Iris was a legend for her great meals and "Happy Hour" prepared for countless guests.

Later, when "Father Time" began to creep up on them, they took up residence at the retirement resort of Andover Terrace in Salmon Arms, BC, where they still had a view of their beautiful lake.

Their daughter Karen and her husband Cliff bought the Sorrento Place and are keeping the memories and hospitality going.

Bud will be 96 on September 19th and Iris will be 95 on November 8th, of this year. At the end of December 2021, Bud will have collected his CN Pension for 40 years, after 38 years' service!

Our CN Pensioners' Association Scholarship Committee has now completed the 9th year of your scholarship program. The awards (25) in the amount of \$1,500 each to children, grandchildren and great-grandchildren of "contributing" members of the CNPA have been mailed to the successful applicants.

In addition to the CNPA National Council awards, Moncton Council continues to fund two additional scholarships for grandchildren and great-grandchildren of sponsors who are contributing members of Moncton Council No. 1.
