Call for stories

"RailVets' News" goes out to members three times a year - October, February and May - and we are looking for stories that would be of interest to fellow railroaders and would like to hear about your life on the railroad. With almost 2400 members there are lots of stories to tell in what could become a regular column in each edition.

Ours was a 24-hour, 7-days-a-week environment with a huge territory extending coast to coast to coast, and people working together in every facet of its operation to make it all happen - some in office buildings, shops, isolated locations or on trains, working alone or in groups, in difficult terrain and harsh weather conditions, different shifts or from a spare board. We met many people along the way and worked with a very diverse workforce. Each of us has his/her own stories - a story about a special event, a funny or unusual occurrence, a unique opportunity, interesting career path, a happy occasion or memorable incident.

The length of your articles could be up to a page in length and can be submitted to any member of the executive for inclusion in the newsletter. Deadline dates for articles are usually by the end of the third week in the month previous to publication. This is your newsletter and we are anxious to hear your story!

Thanks to all those who have submitted their stories, which have already been published in our last few editions; they were great examples of life on the railroad.

Your Stories

I started my work for CN Rail in September 1953, fresh off the boat from The Netherlands. I was 16 years old and came here with my parents and 5 siblings. Worked as a "call boy" in the downtown crew clerk office, as yard checker in Calder Yard, station agent in North Edmonton, billing clerk in the 104 Street freight sheds, and eventually as junior clerk in the General Freight Office which became, and is now called Marketing. Had several jobs there as secretary, carload tracer and rate clerk until I was transferred to the Freight Traffic Department in Winnipeg in 1960, a week after our oldest son was born.



I lodged 8 weeks in the YMCA (the loneliest time of my life!) before my wife and baby could join me.

Worked there as rate adviser, chief clerk in the Assiniboine Area office, played chess during lunch hours with Kal Juvonen, John Kimpinski (we went fishing many Saturdays) and others for 8 years. Two more sons were born there, and in summer 1968 I was transferred to HQ Marketing in Montreal. This began an exciting 23-year time span in my career as I was blessed with several promotions, was assigned to participate in a number of special projects that included fellow team workers from other departments while I was serving in two different business units. In the final year I was assigned to a CN Rail consulting team and spent 9 weeks in Sao Paulo, Brazil, on a project for that state's railway. I retired as System Manager Marketing Pulp and Paper business unit in October 1991, after a grand retirement party. I left behind many great colleagues and friends at CN and in my church.

In as much as Edmonton was hometown for my wife and myself, we retired here and have lived here now for nearly 31 years. So it has been a long time since the Winnipeg and Montreal days. I remember those days with great fondness.

During my retirement in Edmonton, I worked for nearly 22 years, mostly part-time, as development officer, fund raiser and capital campaign manager for The King's University, a Christian university that relies heavily on financial support from donors all over Western Canada.

Now, at 85, I am fully retired but still enjoy my woodworking projects in the basement of our house, and am still very much involved in my church.

We are grateful every day that we have been so very blessed in my career and in our retirement !!

September 2022, - Pension & Health Care Committee Updates– Blake Olson

1. The **CN Pension Committee** met virtually on September 20th 2022. The meeting was attended by all regular members and chaired by Union co-chair K.C. James. There were several preparatory meetings where issues related to the Committee and functions and other issues were discussed with CN.
2. At the Committee meeting there was the typical review of all new and outstanding Pensions and approvals.
3. The most significant news at the meeting was the announced departure of Sean Finn, who was the Company Co-Chair but more importantly, CN's Executive Vice-President and Chief Legal Officer. Sean has been a part of the Committee for more than 14 years. He also had an important relationship to the CN Pensioners:
 - a. Sean recognized the importance of the CNPA as equal partners on the Pension Committee, and created a third Co-Chair position for the CNPA President.
 - b. He approached the pensioners to assist CN in various community and corporate initiatives and as a result negotiated a Partnership agreement with the CNPA which benefited both parties. As a result, the Pensioners played a key and critical role at events like the CN 100 celebration, CN's ECO CONNEXIONS Tree Planting initiatives, Safety Events, CN Community Fund, Local communications, and committees. In return, the CNPA was provided with financial and membership recruitment support, assistance with our Newsletters, enhancement to the RRITC program and more.
 - c. Sean's relationship with the pensioners will be missed, but we wish him well in his retirement. The Company Co-Chair position will be filled by Christina Circelli, Sean's legal department associate and a long time member of the Committee.
4. We received an overview of the CN's current market conditions and supply chain management from CN VP Keith Reardon.
5. Of note were comments from a couple committee Union leaders, who were concerned about the apparent loss of committee discussions as a direct result of the virtual meetings over the past 2 ½ years. They indicated this has impacted the way we used to do business. Of particular concern, as these unions head into negotiations, was impact of the ongoing national inflation/cost of living pressures being faced by both current employees and pensioners. The Union improvement account has had a negative balance it seems like forever. They want to have face to face meetings sooner than later to review options and opportunities related to the Pension Plan. CNPA President Reg Hebert supported the unions assertions and agreed that costing and discussion of options is required. The Company indicated that they would provide some account numbers but did not commit to anything further.
6. It is important to note that Canadian inflation is running at an annualized rate of about 8%.
7. Despite the significant volatility in worldwide markets this year and rampant inflation, I am unable to give you the current financial status of the Plan, as the next update from CNID will be at the November meeting. We last received a financial update in March on the year end 2021 status. We are confident our Plan investments are being well managed as usual during this financial turmoil and the overall funding status is positive despite the negative market pressure on our investments.
8. You received the CN Pension Plan annual report in July which provided you with the Plans status as of December 31, 2021 and announced indexation for 2023. The **maximum** monthly increase is \$79.92.
9. We were also advised by CN that they have not determined when or if face to face meetings will restart.

Health Care Committee Fall 2022 Update

1. The HC Committee met on September 28/29 virtually with both regular and alternate members. As is usual, the committee reviewed the financial status of the plan and implications for the Premium rate adjustments required for 2023. We also received program updates from our Medavie partners.
2. While the Plan continues to be in good shape financially, our continued concern is the impact of high claimants on our finances. The cost to the Plan continues to increase annually. Currently, 137 (0.3%) plan members claim 17% of all expenses.
3. While we had a small, but anticipated Plan loss for 2021, and anticipate the same for 2022 we were able to keep increases to an average of just **2.0% in 2023** due to some provision adjustments affecting high claimants and drawing on surplus funds. Annual Renewal letters will be issued in early November as usual.
4. The Committee will, over the next 6 months, study the Plan administrative, entry options, membership, accessibility and benefit provisions and potentially recommend future changes where appropriate and positive for the Plan.
5. We continue to promote the increased member use of our **MAIL ORDER PHARMACY** provisions available, which lower the cost of member prescriptions AND have them delivered direct to their door. Go to the **HEALTH CARE** section of the **CNPA National Website** for contact information.

6. Of particular importance for **Western Canada members**, Medavie Blue Cross and the Western Canada provincial Blue Cross agencies are going through a computer system transition on Oct. 17. Every member in the west will be receiving a letter explaining the transition **AND** new membership cards. While the change should be seamless, members should read and follow the recommendations in the communications. For other than direct pharmacy payment of prescription medication, the simplest way to submit other Extended Health Care claims is by using the **MEDAVIE BLUE CROSS MOBILE APP**. Easy to register & simple to submit claims directly online.

The Health Care Committee reps continue to do an excellent job in managing the Plan provisions, finances and administration. I commend them for their dedication and diligence.
