PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

CNPA and **CN** Partnership Continues

On other matters, we will soon complete the extension and signing of a new Partnership Agreement with CN. This agreement provides mutual benefits to both CN and the CN Pensioners Association through various programs and benefits. One of the new features that we have discussed and agreed to with CN and the CN Pension Committee is the addition of an information session, held at an agreed location each June. For 2025, that session will be held in Kamloops. There will be discussions and information on topics such as our Pension Plans, Health Care Plans, charitable programs where we can participate in support of CN, and benefits that our membership has available to them through various suppliers of goods and services. It will be an informal session, allowing for discussion and questions between the local membership and a group of presenters from both CN and the CNPA.

We currently enjoy a well-organized, well-staffed, productive organization that is focused on maintaining the well-being of our members in a number of vital areas. We need to be sure that we continue to be staffed, and that we get replacements for folks that decide to step down after many years of service. You can be one of those replacements, by just checking in with any of the councils that represent your area and finding out where they could use your help. You'll find it can be very rewarding.

HEALTH CARE – EASY AND SIMPLE WAYS TO SUBMIT YOUR CLAIMS

There are two simple ways to submit your Blue Cross Extended Health claims without any paper.

If you don't have it yet, get the **MEDAVIE BLUE CROSS APP** on your phone or tablet. Once the APP has loaded, use your membership card and register. Once registered, you can NOW submit claims by completing the form in the APP, and merely taking pictures of your claim receipts and submit them. Within a few days, the payment will be in the bank and the info on the APP.

On the APP under Account, you will also find your membership card which you can put in your Apple or Google Pay Wallet.

No smart phone? – go on your computer and go to **Medavie Blue Cross** website, again register and log in. You can scan or take pictures of your receipts and again submit them online.

OK, no phone or computer, try to get a close family member that helps you with online issues, to get you registered and help you submit. No paper, no envelopes, no stamps.

Alright, none of the above? You will need to get a printed form. There is one on our CNPA website under Healthcare. Please NOTE the addresses at the bottom have changed recently, so make sure you have the right form.

DID YOU KNOW???

Your CNPA membership renews automatically.

Many of you have been sending in Applications for Membership, perhaps thinking you are required to renew your membership on an annual basis. Nope – we take care of that for you. Once your initial application is processed, you remain a member of CNPA until you cancel. If you are unsure, you can email or call us to check.

2025 SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM

The CNPA SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM IS BACK!

The program is sponsored by the National Council of CN Pensioners (CNPA). Its purpose is to financially assist the educational pursuit and career development of families of the CN Pensioners Association Contributing Members.



The Program opens on April 15, 2025, and the **application deadline** is **August 13, 2025**. Winners will be notified by the end of the first week of September.

The program provides 25 - \$1,500 one-year scholarships for each fall school year and is open to children, grandchildren, great grandchildren (including legally adopted, stepchildren and step grandchildren) of CNPA Contributing Members. Applicants must have a minimum 80% grade average over the most recent 2 full academic school years to be considered.

For those of you in Canada, we would like to remind you that updating your direct banking information is easy and can be done

online. This secure and convenient option ensures your pension is deposited correctly and on time.

Keeping your information current is essential – it helps us serve you better and ensures you receive all necessary communications without delay. WAS THERE ANYTHING MORE EXCITING AS A CHILD THAN HEARING THOSE TWO MAGICAL WORDS "ALL ABOARD!"

Growing up in Capreol, ON, the child of a CNR employee, we were fortunate to have passes which allowed us to travel for free. Numerous short trips to Toronto to visit relatives and go to the CNE. Longer trips to Ottawa, Montréal, Winnipeg, and even Vancouver. And trips to Cochrane, ON to visit my grandmother and aunt. This required us to change to an ONR train in North Bay, with what seemed like an interminable wait, but was probably only 4 hours. We were small enough at the time to slide under the arms of the row of chairs and try to catch a nap.

We always looked forward to the journeys themselves with anticipation. Who would the crew be taking the train out of Capreol on it's first leg? Would the conductor be our friend's dad? How full would the train be? Would we get a seat to ourselves?

I learned more about Canada and its people on these annual trips than I ever could have learned from books. Staying in iconic CN Hotels, visiting local points of interest, and meeting new and interesting people along the way. Each one was an adventure that will forever be etched in my memory.

I moved to Calgary in the late 1970s but continued to return to Capreol to visit my family. Some trips were by air, others by rail, always switching trains in Winnipeg when heading east so I could take the familiar CNR route to my hometown. I would usually run into someone I knew from Capreol when they changed crews in Hornepayne. Travelling by train felt safe, knowing you were part of a wider CNR family.

On one such trip to Capreol, my older sister asked if I could drive back to Westree with her and the kids. Her husband was a Signal Maintainer there for CNR. This meant I would have to take the Mini back after my visit. The Mini consisted of a single locomotive, a baggage car and one coach car. It travelled between Capreol and Nakina a few times a week with a relaxed schedule. My brother-in-law radioed ahead that there was a passenger at Westree. When I got on the train, the Conductor came down the aisle calling "Ticket, Pass or Excuse!" When he got to me, I told him I needed to purchase a ticket. He said "Doesn't anyone in your family work for the railroad? You wouldn't be up here otherwise." I told him yes, my mother did, but I was too old for a pass. When he asked who my mother was, I said "Gloria Taylor Page". "Oh, I know Gloria" he said.

"There's no way Gloria's daughter is paying to ride the train". I was extremely touched and grateful.



During the trip I was invited back to the baggage car to check out a moose that someone had shot. It was one of the shortest yet most memorable train rides I've had.

My mother came from a family of Railroaders. Her father, George Taylor, was a Telegrapher for ONR in Cochrane, ON. Her brother Donald Taylor was an Operator and brother-in-law Russell Storey was a Brakeman/Conductor for CNR. Russell's sons Guy Storey and William Storey also pursued careers with CNR.

My mother started working for ONR in Cochrane after high school and attending Shaw Business College in Toronto, quite a feat at the time for a young woman from Northern Ontario. She would later credit this as the foundation for her work with CNR. It was in Cochrane that she met her future husband. They lived in numerous places in Northern Ontario due to his job with the OPP. They moved to Capreol in 1961 when my mom was hired for a clerical position with CNR.

She worked in a variety of positions, eventually settling in Accounting and Payroll, where it was rumoured, she knew everyone's SRB numbers by heart. I had gone to school with boys who went on to work for CNR. On visits home, I would run into these old classmates, and they would tell me how helpful she was if there were any issues with their hours or pay.

She bought her first home in 1975 when CNR was divesting itself of some company houses. She was so proud to become a homeowner. She retired in December 1995 and sadly passed away in 2017. I will forever be grateful to her for the wonderful experiences she gave us, and so extremely proud of her.

TO DREAM THE IMPOSSIBLE DREAM



Let's take a quick walk down memory lane and recognize the recent accomplishments of the Railroaders in the Community program. For 2022, we had **420** registered volunteers who collectively raised **\$553,969** and the slogan we created for the 2023 program was **Stretch Targets**. The hope was we would find existing volunteers that weren't currently registered and logging their hours, and maybe encourage some new volunteers.

In 2023, we had **511** volunteers registered, and they collectively raised **\$662,877**, with each of those numbers representing an increase of approximately 20% over the previous year. Incredible as it was, we were selfishly hoping we could get those numbers up even higher, so the slogan for 2024 was **The Sky is the Limit**.

Your efforts to increase the dollars were substantially aided by CN's change in the program that allowed each participant to increase their eligible hours from 150 to 220, thereby increasing their maximum allowable contribution. Even with that increased potential, one could not have predicted your success in 2024. We had an increase in participants of 12%, up to 572 across the Regions, and collectively, CN donated \$940,472 to charities of your choice. For those that like math, that is an increase in participants of 36% and in donations, almost 70% in just 2 years!!!



Take a personal moment and reflect on what almost \$1 MILLION meant to your chosen charities, and the role you played in providing some much-needed financial support for them in 2024. Unfortunately, a moment is about all the time we have to spare, as there is no end in sight to the need for your continuing support in the months and years ahead.

The slogan chosen for 2025 is **To Dream the Impossible Dream** and making it a reality. Two years ago, I would never have dreamed that we could be celebrating breaking through the \$1,000,000 threshold in donations to your charities, but through your dedication and selfless donation of your time, it is within your grasp this year. You should all take immense pride in the role you have played in achieving these results.

Cassie McNutt, a high school student in Kamloops, B.C., has been conducting an annual charity drive to raise funds for the Kamloops Hospice Association. This cause holds a special place in her heart as her extended family has received support from the Hospice in the past.

During the past Christmas season, Cassie's festive display of over 55,000 lights garnered attention, with the CNPA Kamloops/Okanagan local contributing \$1,000 to her drive.

Some of you may remember from our Spring Newsletter in 2023, CN's B.C. Community Board received a funding application from Cassie. Recognizing the importance of her work and the strong connection between CN employees/pensioners and the Hospice, the Board, upon recommendation from CNPA Local & Regional representatives, approved a significant \$10,000 donation to Cassie's Charity Drive 2022.

This generous support from CN was celebrated that year with a special CN cheque presentation to Cassie by Kamloops/Okanagan Pensioners Local executive and members. Cassie has helped raise more than \$200,000 in the last 4 years!

This collaboration highlights the strong community spirit within CN and the CNPA, with employees and pensioners actively supporting local initiatives and demonstrating a commitment to improving the lives of their fellow citizens.

"THE CEILIDH KING" HELPS PEI HOSPITALS

After retiring in 1988 with 32 years of service from CN Engineering in Moncton, NB, **Garnet Buell** returned home to Prince Edward Island to do what he loved - playing music.

A well-rounded musician who plays the acoustic guitar, fiddle, mandolin, and bass guitar, Garnet has generously shared his gifts with his fellow Islanders and used his talents to raise money for good causes, including hospitals and youth sports programs. He has done this primarily through the many Ceilidhs (a social gathering of folk music, dance and storytelling) he organized and played in at various Island venues. He has entertained at church and community events, anniversary parties, weddings and funerals across Canada.

"I had a great railroading career and am happy that CN supports my community service," says Garnet. With the aid of the CN Railroaders in the Community Program and fellow PEI musicians, Garnet raised over \$403,000 for the Queen Elizabeth Hospital in Charlottetown primarily through his many Ceilidhs.

When Kings County Memorial Hospital in Montague, PEI, was undertaking a capital campaign, Garnet made time and helped raise \$900 towards the purchase of much needed X-ray equipment. Another fundraising Ceilidh enabled Garnet and his fellow musicians to present a cheque of \$1,250 to the Hospital Foundation.

Garnet has released several CDs and won a multitude of distinguished awards for his music and community service, including the Order of PEI, the highest honour presented to an individual in the province, as well as the Queen's Diamond Jubilee Award. While he

KEEPING HIS COMMUNITY SAFE FOR OVER 20 YEARS

When **Derrick Paul** wanted to find a meaningful way to give back to his rural municipality of St. Clements, MB, over 20 years ago, becoming a volunteer firefighter seemed to be a good fit. "It was a way to help the community where I raised my family and get to know other people who shared the same safety mindset," says Derrick. The core value of safety was one Derrick held closely after 35 years at CN, where he started as a Carman Apprentice followed by roles as Assistant Track Supervisor, Bridge Supervisor, Bridge Inspector, Damage Prevention Officer and Risk Management Officer.

As a volunteer firefighter, Derrick is first on the scene at motor vehicle collisions, water and ice rescues. He responds to structure, grass and car fires. "Being in a rural area, we do not have fire hydrants all around and must haul our own water to the scene. Sometimes we have to make several trips," says Derrick, who has been trained to a Level 1 firefighting status.

Public safety and fire prevention education in schools is an important part of his work. "I always use the opportunity in the classroom to spread the message to kids about rail safety and the importance of staying away from tracks and trains," says Derrick.

When not on call, he can be found at the East Selkirk Fire Department performing equipment maintenance and checking that the fire trucks, water pumps and apparatus are in good working order. Financial and material support from CN to the

department in recognition of Derrick's volunteer time has been put towards improving firefighter training.

"We received a donation of two old CN box cars to conduct live burns in a controlled environment a few years ago and used the money to get them transported to our training site," says Derrick. Railroaders In the Community funds have also been very useful for the purchase of equipment for search and rescue training. "It would be a lot harder for volunteer organizations to get the work they need done without the support of companies like CN. "It is really helping communities."

CN PENSIONERS KEEP RAILROAD HISTORY ALIVE

CN's rail lines reach deep into northern Quebec's resource-rich Abitibi-Temiscamingue region, and many of the area's small towns sprang up from stations founded by CN and its precursor railroads like the National Continental Railway. One such town is Senneterre, which was founded in 1913 under the name Nottaway and became Senneterre in 1919, the same year CN was created.

Claude Chartrand has been Vice-President of the Senneterre Historical Society since 2013. Claude retired from CN in 2006 after 35 years as a machinist and foreman at the former Senneterre Locomotive Reliability Centre.

"I'm very interested in the history of my community," explains Claude, "especially as it relates to railroading." Senneterre is not far from where the last spike was driven in 1913 on the original line between Winnipeg and Quebec City. Each year since the 100th anniversary in 2013, Claude has animated a historical train ride from Senneterre to the site of the last spike. Claude is also the society's archivist and his wife, Joëlle Gagné is responsible for digitization of historical documents.

"There are other CN pensioners who volunteer for the Senneterre Historical Society," says Claude. "Léopold Provencher was a station manager and telegraph operator at several stations in Abitibi and now demonstrates the telegraph for the public in addition to being our treasurer. André Ferland also worked for CN as a station manager and telegraph operator throughout Quebec and is now the society's

webmaster, along with his wife Monique Plouffe, and a member of the society's board."

CN recognises the contributions of these dedicated history buffs by supporting the Senneterre Historical Society through the CN Railroaders in the Community program.

life.







MONCTON NO. 1 COUNCIL – WHERE IT ALL BEGAN

"A Brief History" - CN Pensioner's Moncton Council #1 is affiliated with the National Council of CN Pensioners Associations Inc. as recorded on October 16, 1979. Historically, the group in Moncton reaches back more than 60 years and operated under different names, such as the Retired Railway Employees Association Inc. Records remaining from that time show that they met at the Appleton Club, the Odd Fellows Hall, or later in the 1980's in the Lion's Centre. In the mid 1980's, meeting rooms were established in the Atlantic Building on John Street and continued there for about 10 years. From 1993 until the Centre opened in 1995, meetings were held at the Union Centre. The business concerns of long ago were much like in today's meetings.

It was time for a "new home" - During the early 90's a financial campaign was put in place. CN generously donated the land; donations came in from CN employees and their families. Grants were obtained from the Provincial and Federal Government. The official opening of the CN Pensioners Center was on Friday, September 15th, 1995. We, today thank those who had the wisdom, foresight, and a vision for the future. A note of significance is that this building is the only building "owned" by CN Pensioners in all of Canada today.

The Centre on Curry Street is available to members for various **recreational activities** and will accommodate about 100 persons in a wheelchair accessible hall. It has a small kitchenette, pool table, dart boards for the "active" as well as a television/VCR and videos for those who are "not so active". There is a limited amount of reading material to be found, and this may include the latest newsletter from CN or VIA.

In 2002 a **computer system** was purchased, and the Communication Committee was, and is, more than happy to provide "basic introduction to computer" training at the request of any interested member. Members just need to call Centre and leave a message; a committee member will call back and set up a time and date for training.

Regular Meetings of the Moncton council are held at 2:00 p.m.





on the third Thursday of each month, except July and August, when no meetings are held. In December, the usual date is moved ahead for the Annual Christmas Party. These regular meetings provide members an opportunity to hear reports of National Officers, the latest scuttlebutt on the pension board, Blue Cross, or something as simple as a discussion of a newspaper reporter's vain attempts to describe railway equipment. The meetings also provide old work buddies a place for a little "bragging" or story telling.

The Center is located at 1 Curry St., in Moncton.

STAYING IN TOUCH WITH THE WIDER COMMUNITY

After we retire, keeping connected to the wider community is often a major challenge. We can lose contact with former co-workers and to the activities we used to share. As we grow older, health issues may limit our mobility and activity. Medical research shows that isolation can lead to depression and further health problems.

But retirement doesn't have to be that way. There are activities all around us aimed specifically at the post-55 age group. The question is – how do we find them?

When seniors start to experience isolation and depression, they often first confide in their family doctors. Doctors might prescribe anti-depressant medication as one way to cope. Social Prescribing is an alternative. Doctors can now issue a prescription that links the patient with qualified, experienced Social Connectors who work out of Senior Centers in Winnipeg and across the province. The doctor's prescription also goes out to the Social Connector, who then contacts and meets the senior. They jointly work out ways to bring the senior back into the community. It's a real prescription, but not for a pharmaceutical.

That's the subject of a monthly 1-hour radio show on CJNU 93.7 FM, a Winnipeg non-profit community radio station. Hosted by CN pensioner Jim Feeny, **Insights on Social Prescribing** is produced in partnership with The Manitoba Association of Senior Communities and Active Aging in Manitoba. The focus is on helping Manitoba seniors overcome isolation and easily find ways to connect to people and activities around them. It airs at noon on the last Wednesday of each month. The station can be heard in Winnipeg and vicinity at 93.7 on the FM dial, online at www.CJNU.ca and on Bell MTS TV Channel 725.

This story describes how Social Prescribing is handled in Manitoba. The program itself operates across Canada and is administered provincially. For more information in Manitoba, the two partner organizations are: Manitoba Association of Senior Communities (www.manitobaseniorcommunities.ca), and Active Aging in Manitoba (www.activeagingmb.ca).

In other Provinces, call the free 211 number and ask for information on Social Prescribing. 211 is Canada's primary source of information for government and community-based, non-clinical health and social services.
