PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

It's that time of year again to personally bring season's greetings on behalf of the National Council to all of our members. We hope this finds you well and you are able to spend quality time with family and friends through the holidays.

Three times a year, I write a President's message that I hope is interesting enough to keep you reading, while still conveying information that is important for all of you to know. This edition is no different, but to **change gears** slightly, I thought I would use my last four President's messages to give you a **peek under the hood** of this well-oiled machine we call the CN Pensioners Association so you can take a closer look at what makes it run.

Like every other quality vehicle, it requires fuel and a system to convert that fuel to energy. The **fuel input** for our Association is the strength of our membership and the annual dues that we receive from you. The **fuel injection system** for the CNPA is our National Treasurer, who receives all the **fuel** (dues)—most of which he channels back through the **delivery system** out to Councils across the country. Then, much like the **cylinders and pistons** in an engine, those Councils convert that **fuel to energy** by funding social, economic, and fraternal benefits for their respective memberships.

However, there are so many components in today's cars that require electrical energy to properly function that we require a second system, which is a complete **electrical system**. This system must have the capability to manage and monitor huge amounts of data and to deliver requested portions of that data out to various components quickly in a format that can be used for specific tasks. This **electrical system** for the CNPA is managed by two technicians, our Membership Co-Chairs. They not only manage the information flow seamlessly, but just like that car, every time we add or change a component, they redesign the **electrical delivery system** to meet the new requirement.

Fuel and electrical systems are the lifelines of any vehicle, and our systems are superbly managed by three volunteer technicians: Treasurer Ron Charles and Membership Co-Chairs Peter Moloney and Nancy Zajacz. In their own roles, and as they interact with each other, they convert your **fuel input** into manageable data for the Association and others, providing that **energy** that ultimately converts to benefits for you.

Stay tuned for the next edition, when we will explore the **safety options** available with this vehicle.

CN PENSIONERS ASSOCIATION SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM 2025

For its 13th consecutive year, the CN Pensioners Association Scholarship Committee has completed its scholarship program. We've mailed 25 awards of **\$1,500 each** to the successful applicants, all of whom are children, grandchildren, or great-grandchildren of our contributing members.

In addition to our national awards, several regional and local councils also provided scholarships and bursaries. Most of these awards are funded locally, but they are administered by the same people who fund the national program.

- **Moncton Council:** Two additional scholarships were funded for applicants sponsored by Moncton Council No. 1.
- **Manitoba Provincial Council:** Five Harvey Hosfield bursaries and one trade bursary were awarded.
- **Quebec Region:** Two trade bursaries were given in honour of Luc Grenier.
- **Ontario Provincial Council:** The council awarded an additional bursary.

We received 203 applications this year, but unfortunately, 42 were rejected for various reasons. The most common disqualifying factors were missing or incomplete marks, failure to provide a résumé, and the sponsor not being a contributing member. This year, we also encountered issues with secure or password-protected documents.

Please note: We can accept only **straight, simple, unprotected PDF documents**. If we cannot open or forward a document, the application will be rejected. All application materials are deleted at the end of the selection process each year.

For those interested in applying next year, the program is scheduled to open on **May 1, 2026**. Please read **all instructions** on our website well in advance.

We wish to extend a huge thank you to everyone who made this year's program a success.

- To the **27 volunteers** on the Scholarship Committee and local selection committees, many of whom have participated for years, thank you for your dedicated service.
- To the **applicants**, thank you for taking the time to prepare your professional submissions. We're particularly impressed with the volunteer work you all do in your communities.
- To **Peter Moloney** and **Nancy Zajacz**, our National Membership Chairpersons, for ensuring that each sponsor was a qualified, contributing member.
- To **Ron Charles**, our National Treasurer, for issuing the cheques.

The future of this project will be a key topic at our Annual Directors' Meeting in November, with the possibility of offering it again for the 2026–2027 school year. If you were not successful this year, we encourage you to apply again if you still meet the criteria.

By mail: Your income tax slips will be mailed to you by the end of February.

Online: For earlier access, your documents will be available on our secure web portal around mid-February. You can log in at <https://cnbenefits.hroffice.com/> to view, download, or print them once they're ready.

WHAT ELSE YOU'LL FIND ONLINE

The CN Pension web portal also has other useful documents, including your monthly pension deposit notices and your annual pension statements. You can also use the portal to update your banking information, download forms, and read helpful articles.

Whether you get your tax slips by mail or online, you'll have everything you need to file your taxes.

EXPORAIL, THE CANADIAN RAILWAY MUSEUM: A TESTAMENT TO THE PEOPLE POWERING THE RAILWAYS

Exporail, the Canadian Railway Museum, is a registered not-for-profit organization and an accredited professional museum. Born out of the volunteer-run Canadian Railroad Historical Association (CRHA) and founded in 1932, it is located less than a half hour drive from downtown Montreal on thirty-five acres in Delson/Saint-Constant, Quebec. It is the biggest railway museum in Canada and one that brings together a unique collection of rolling stock, equipment, artifacts, and buildings to tell the proud story of Canada's rail industry.

On site, visitors can enjoy a tramway ride, an operating turntable, an operating passenger train, a working steam locomotive, and a working miniature train for children. The site boasts six kilometres of track and numerous station and workshop buildings housing fascinating artifacts and exhibits. Inside the impressive 9,222 m² Angus Pavilion is a permanent exhibit of 50 locomotives, freight cars and passenger equipment. Other rolling stock includes the beautiful Van Horne business car; the Royal Hudson locomotive, which carried members of the royal family across Canada for the 1939 royal visit of King George VI; the first streamlined road diesel locomotive built by Montreal Locomotive Works in 1950 for CN; a highly innovative rotary snow blower; and a charming mobile School Car that, in its day, travelled through parts of Northern Ontario, complete with a classroom and teacher's quarters.

The Museum also houses some 15,000 small artifacts, such as uniforms, timetables, tools, and even fascinating personal items of long past railroaders, each helping to tell the story of the importance of the rail industry to Canada. The Museum's archives are also a treasure trove of photographic and written materials for researchers and historians alike. The Museum's parent organization publishes the longest running railway history magazine in Canada, *Canadian Rail/Rail Canadien*. Started in 1937 and dedicated to quality articles in both official languages, it showcases the Museum's collection, as well as written and photographic works by contributors from all over Canada. Maybe you would like to submit an original article for the *Canadian Rail/Rail Canadien*. Even if you're not a writer but have great material for an article, there are volunteers who can write it with you.

Exporail is a veritable shrine to a very special breed of Canadians—railroaders from both past and present. This is a place where you can live the legacy of the railroaders who came before us and experience the pride that comes with sharing this special industry with present day railroaders and the public alike. Whether you choose to visit in person or virtually, the Exporail Museum is a great way to stay connected with our industry and to ensure the storytelling continues. exporail.org/en/home/.

WHEN A CN PENSIONER PASSES AWAY – THE IMPORTANCE OF TIMELY NOTIFICATION

Losing a loved one is never easy, and we extend our heartfelt condolences to all families during these difficult times. While grieving, families face many practical matters that need attention, and one of the most critical is notifying CN Pension and Benefits Administration immediately when a CN pensioner or their surviving spouse passes away.

WHO SHOULD CALL AND WHEN

Time is of the essence when reporting a death. Contact CN Pension and Benefits Administration as soon as possible after the death occurs, whether it is the CN pensioner or their spouse who has passed away. The call should be made by:

- The eligible surviving spouse (if able)
- Someone with registered Power of Attorney for the deceased pensioner
- The designated Executor or Administrator of the estate
- A family member acting on behalf of the deceased (if none of the above are available)

Once you call, CN Pension and Benefits Administration will immediately begin the necessary processes. If there is an eligible surviving spouse, they will start the process for survivor pension benefits. They will also handle notifications to insurance companies for any CN-sponsored life insurance policies.

IT ALL STARTED WITH A WISHING WELL

After retiring from 34 years of service at Thornton Yard, Keith Dyrda sought meaningful ways to stay active. He and his wife, Dixie, began assisting elderly neighbours with tasks they could no longer manage, but it was a random Internet search that launched Keith on a new six-year journey of crafting and creation. His workshop is now a testament to the power of that simple idea. A self-described hobbyist, Keith has found a second career in repurposing wood, transforming scraps into charming, handcrafted pieces that delight friends, family, and neighbours.

It all started with a wishing well. After seeing a picture online, he decided to build one himself. The first one, a six-and-a-half-foot-tall masterpiece, was so impressive that, when his wife sent a photo to her sister-in-law, a new path was forged. The requests started rolling in, and to date, Keith has built and gifted over 80 wishing wells and 66 wheelbarrows, often letting recipients choose the colour and style. He has also frequently donated his creations to CNPA functions as door prizes or giveaways.

However, the most significant chapter of his creative journey began with a simple request from his sister: a wooden wiener dog planter that resembled her own pet. This request led to a new business venture and a partnership with his wife, who, as it turns out, is the true artistic force behind the operation.

While Keith handles the heavy lifting—tracing the patterns, cutting the wood with a jigsaw, and assembling the pieces—his wife, Dixie, is the meticulous designer and painter. She draws each pattern on cardboard, carefully planning the construction, and then brings the animals to life with intricate paintwork. As Keith puts it, “She is actually the driving force behind it all.”

Together, the couple has created an entire menagerie of wooden animals, from zebras and giraffes to pigs. His “Snoopy” doghouses are a particular favourite. Together, they have over 30 different patterns stored in their garage, with new ideas, such as a raccoon planter, always on the horizon. This creative partnership has transformed a solitary hobby into a shared passion, filling their home with the joyful chaos of creation.

Keith Dyrda’s story is a reminder that some of the most fulfilling projects begin with a simple whim and grow into something truly special when shared with a loved one. What started with one wishing well has blossomed into a full-fledged creative enterprise, with each piece bringing a touch of whimsy to every home it graces.

RAILROADERS IN THE COMMUNITY: FLORENCE PARLEE

FLORENCE PARLEE'S FAITH GUIDES HER COMMUNITY SERVICE

Florence Parlee is an active volunteer at St. Henry's Roman Catholic Church in Melville, SK, where she has lived since 1991. "I'm not home much," laughs Flo. "I'm a people person and enjoy meeting new families and getting them involved in our parish and organizations."

Flo worked for CN in Melville as a secretary in the Transportation Department from 1974 to 1996. "It was the best job I ever had. I thoroughly enjoyed it and had some wonderful bosses and colleagues," recalls Flo, who grew up in Grayson, SK.

Flo estimates she devotes between 24 and 32 hours a month at the church. At weekend mass, she is a Lector and/or Eucharistic Minister and Rosary Leader. She is one of many who gather to count the weekend collection and is in charge of depositing it into the parish bank account.

She is also a board member on the parish council, representing the Catholic Women's League of which she is President. Members of the league work hand in hand with the parish, donating their time to serve funerals and other parish functions, including many fundraisers. "Our pre-Christmas bazaar in November is our biggest event," says Flo. "There's a lot of preparation involved to assemble the baskets to raffle off and sell tickets. I make carrot pudding, cabbage rolls and soup for sale. Other members make things like pierogies, pies, sweet trays and fruitcakes, as well as beautiful knitted and crocheted items."

St. Henry's Social Justice Organization hosts free community meals twice a year and serves well above 100 people each time—and Flo helps with that too. "It is a time for replenishing, visiting, and welcoming new people to our community."

COVID kept a lot of parishioners away during the pandemic, and paying the utilities and upkeep on the building has been a constant struggle. CN's grant money in recognition of Flo's volunteer time through the Railroaders in the Community program has gone a long way to help pay those bills. "It's a fantastic program that supports CN retirees and employees' community service," says Flo. "I would encourage any other CN employees or retirees who are in the parish or volunteering anywhere else to submit the hours they spend helping in their community. The funds do so much good."

When she does manage to find any spare time, Flo enjoys curling in the winter and tending to her garden and flowers in the summer. She also cherishes family time with her three children, six grandchildren (one of whom is a CN locomotive engineer), and eight great-grandchildren, who all live close by.

August 24, 2025



13. Marcel Huot


June 21, 2025
